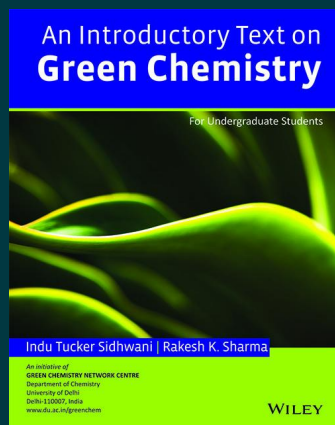




An Introductory Text on Green Chemistry: For Undergraduate Students
